



## Christmas is coming

My wife and I were walking through Covent Garden on Monday 23rd October. Our way was blocked by a delivery van – unloading Christmas trees! That's more than two months before the event, so a long period of expectation.

I shouldn't co mplain because in the church we have to plan far ahead, always looking forwards to what is to come. The Wimborne Team are already thinking about Easter 2024, and this 'Christmas letter' is authored on 14th November. It's not even Advent yet. Now this could become a rant, but rather I want to direct our thoughts to anticipation, an eagerness for what is to come. The word that sums this all up is hope. Hope is a confidence in the future. Hope flies in the face of experienced reality – but it looks beyond the now. In terms of our Christian faith,

As I write, war in the Holy Land seems to present all concerned with an almost hopeless situation. It is impossible to be dispassionate from a distance about world events that cause such division and distress. What must it be like for the numerous *Holy Innocents* whose lives are lost, marred, and shattered by war? Where is hope in the midst of such violence and cruelty?

hope is a trust and belief in the goodwill

and purposes of God.

Saint Paul had to face up to the reality of great suffering and address this issue. In his letter, *Romans 8:18-26*, Paul writes of the glory that lies beyond, a freeing from the bondage of decay – the great hope. "Hope that is seen is no hope at all", because it is real. By definition, hope



is about faith and trust – that a return to Eden is possible. The Spirit of God abounds all the more where there is despair, as light in the midst of darkness, as goodness in the face of evil.

The term, 'the Day After' is being coined in the media to address what might happen when this (and any) war ends. It is both a realisation that wars always end, and that life goes on. Where there is life, there is hope.

Christmas is a time to celebrate the life (the incarnation) of a holy child. The circumstances were seemingly unfavourable – let the reader draw the parallels of the nativity story with our present times. In Christ, hope is born from above – hope that we can take hold of and fully trust and believe in.



And so, the time of expectation unfolds once again - not a month or two but eternal in its scope. The Spirit helps us in our weakness. The Spirit intercedes with all creation that was, and is, and is to come. The Spirit brings the birth and rebirth of peace and reconciliation in Christ.

Maranatha, Come Lord Jesus. A blessing upon you, your families and loved ones and especially for those who presently trouble us. We pray as the Lord directed, for His saving grace at times of testing, and for delivery from the evil one. Embrace hope in Him!

Come and pray that in 2024 this may be the way ahead for our world, nation, community, and everyone we love.






A short story from the Bible


## Cleaning the Druitt window

It was decided to take advantage of the expensive scaffolding, erected for repairing the stonework in the South Transept, to repair and clean the window. This work is paid for, in part, by a generous grant from the Friends of Wimborne Minster. Stained glass experts Nathan Cooper and Michelle Dawson, of Bridport-based restoration and conservation firm Stonecroft, are at work. and you can see the difference in these two details. The window was given in 1892 in memory of the eminent surgeon Dr William Druitt, and the panels show healing miracles and the vision from Revelations of









the Water of Life flowing out from God for the healing of the nations.

## Churchwardens vs. Bellringers





Two choirs sang for the event, and the Salvation Army band played hymns on the cobbles by the north porch.





## New Guide Book for The Chained Library

The new Guide Book for the historic Chained Library of Wimborne Minster has just been published. Written and photographed entirely by the Library volunteers, it explains the history of one of the first public reference libraries in the country. It offers a clear and detailed description, with illustrations, of therange and variety of the books on display: from Saint Anselm, to early Reformer Erasmus; statesman, explorer and writer Sir Walter Raleigh to Renaissance philosopher Machiavelli; from a 'Pirate Botanist' to a one of the earliest books on mental health: from an 800-year-old

hand written manuscript on vellum, to one of the earliest examples of European printing. This is a wonderful memento of a visit to the Chained Library, or for those who love books, history and the curious.

The guide book will be available to purchase from the Minster Gift Shop from December (just in time for Christmas) at a price of £6.00. Profits from the sale will be divided between the Library, to help maintain and preserve these precious books, and the Minster itself.

### Toasting Forks and Candlesticks: an update



Last month's magazine described the two toasting forks with the Quarterjack on, and mentioned a pair of brass candlesticks that are in the vestry. To complete the story (for the moment), we now know how the candlesticks came to the Minster.

When the portable nave altar was coming into use, around 2003, Head Server Christine Feltham needed a pair of small candlesticks for use on it. She kindly donated a pair that she had inherited from her parents. Living in Bournemouth, her father used to cycle quite often to Wimborne and must have found the candlesticks here. The nave altar now has a matched set of wooden candlesticks and cross, so the brass ones have not been in use recently.


