Aspects of Spirituality Exploring Spirituality through the Arts Wednesdays in November

This year, Aspects of Spirituality will look at the role Arts and Crafts play in enabling us to express and engage with the spiritual aspects of our lives. We have a very interesting range of speakers, all with significant experience of the arts, as practitioners and consumers.

There will be refreshments available from 7.00pm. Each talk will start at 7.30p.m., and last about 45 minutes with time for discussion afterwards.

1st November – Gravity's Edge

Victoria Cresswell, a Dance and Alexander Technique teacher who has worked in UK, Europe and the USA, will explore dance as a practice for strengthening qualities that aid spiritual practice: trust, surrender, awareness and attention.

8th November – If Music be the Food of Love

Carol Bruton will offer samples of music through which people experience different types of spirituality. She will share examples that have shaped her own spiritual life through performing and listening to music.

15th November – Air and Angels

De Ashton will talk about poetry and spirituality in her talk. De has a lifetime of experience as a teacher and poet.

22nd November – The Veins of Spirituality

Beatrice Dopita will be talking about painting, photography, sculpture, and Minna Harvey will give the artist's view, focusing on her triptychs.

29th November – How do we play spirituality?

Carol Lehmann will tell us about playful art and crafts as a means to help children and young people to an understanding of spirituality.

Chris McKay

Many readers of this magazine will already know of the death of Chris McKay, aged 74. Chris was a world expert on turret clocks, and the diocesan clock advisor. The Minster was incredibly lucky to have him living nearby, in Hinton Martell, and for him to be willing to look after the Minster clock; he was a generous friend to the Minster.

As a young man, Chris was an electronics engineer, designing automatic testing equipment. He later taught design and technology in a number of Dorset schools. However, his fame was as an expert consultant on clocks. He is the author of numerous books, including a standard handbook on turret clocks and a history, *Big Ben*, published by Oxford University Press in 2010. This year he was writing another book, about the Minster clock, which was unfinished at his death. I was helping him with it in various ways. The playful photo with



the face of our clock is from the first chapter of the book. The photo with headlamp (above) is one I took in Feb 2016, on the scaffolding in front of the disassembled astronomical clock. He is wearing his 'take the photo and let me get back to work' face.

A memorial service for Chris McKay will be held in the Minster on Oct 11 at 1pm and all are welcome.

Dela Woodcock, 1931 - 2023



On September 6th we celebrated the life of the late Dela Woodcock. She was a lady of deep and quiet faith. During the service, a selection of the kneelers that she designed over the years, and created together with the Minster Broderers, were on display (see photos). Dela came from a military family, with a strong ethos of service, and lived through the Blitz in London. At boarding

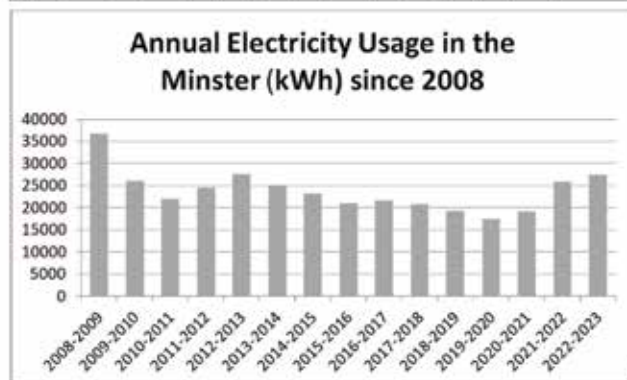
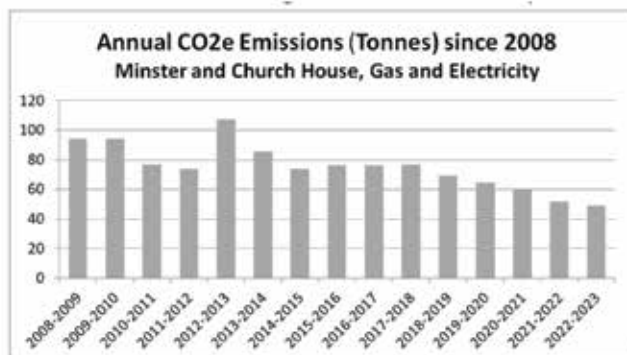


CMS news from Phil and Sylvie Good

Through the CMS, the Minster has been supporting Phil and Sylvie Good for the last five years in their work with new Christians in the Lebanon, a period with many ups and downs for them. They are now returning finally to England and the CMS supports them for another 6 months in the readjustment this needs. They report that a family they were close to, and which helped them visit families in Beirut and the Bekaa valley, has now moved to the USA. A youth team from SOMA (Sharing of Ministries Abroad) visited a school for refugee children in north Lebanon in the summer, 'a life-changing experience for everyone'. We would like to arrange a visit from Phil and Sylvie once they are settled back here.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions in the past year (2022-23)

We have been measuring the annual greenhouse gas emissions from the Minster and Church House each year since 2008 and the good news is that emissions for the past year were only 49 tonnes, the lowest since our measurements began in 2008-09 (see first graph).



The 49 tonnes is the combined total from the four main sources of emissions - gas and electricity in the Minster and Church House. The largest reduction this year, over 30%, was from gas in Church House, made possible by the installation of the Hive control system in November. There is, however, one cause for concern. The electricity used in the Minster since September 2021 has increased by more than 25% compared with the previous 2 years (see second graph) and this goes against our commitment under the EcoChurch scheme to "set sufficient targets for reducing the carbon footprint of our church premises and achieving year-on-year improvements in energy efficiency."

We have identified some possible reasons for the increase including a) coming out of lockdown, b) installing a dehumidifier in the Chained Library and c) changes to the lighting. We will be looking at the effect of each and are hoping the usage in 2023-24 can be reduced to close to the 2019-21 value.

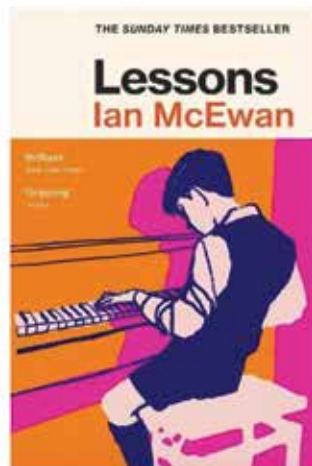

Book review: *Lessons*, by Ian McEwan

(ISBN 978-1787-333-9701, hardback)



This is this highly gifted and skilled writer's eighteenth novel, the latest in a long series of success including the 1998 Book winner *Amsterdam*.

The novel opens with Roland, aged 11, the main character, recently arrived at an English boarding school from Libya where his father, accompanied by his mother, serves in the British Army. Roland is receiving a piano lesson from his beautiful female teacher. His relationship with this teacher is to resonate throughout his life. Two pages on, twenty-five years later, Roland awakes one morning to find that his German wife has mysteriously

disappeared, leaving him with their months-old son. Despite the fact she communicates with him from her parents' home in Germany, he is seriously suspected of murder.

Over the ensuing years he proves to be a devoted father, an ardent pursuer of women and the Fine Arts, but ineffectual in the world of work. He has the ability to become a writer but ends up composing captions for advertisements. He has the ability to become a concert pianist but ends up playing background music at afternoon tea at a London hotel.

Moving back and forth in time from 1959 to 2021 the book portrays Ronald's relationships with his father, mother, son, sister, two brothers – one of whom is a complete unknown, his piano teacher and his two wives, his second marriage ending in tragedy. All of these are beautifully portrayed. There is a difficulty empathizing with Roland himself since he is passive, much given to introspection

and regret.

The background to the novel is a period of time which many of us have experienced partly or in totality, and McEwan portrays extraordinarily well the atmosphere and repercussions of several outstanding events: the spread of radiation from Chernobyl, the Cuban missile crisis, the fall of the

Berlin Wall and, finally, living through Covid. At 500 pages, *Lessons* is long for a modern novel. One has the feeling McEwan is letting his material and inventive mind run away with him. However, the command of language, ideas and plotting is excellent. Not one of his best, but then he has set himself a very high standard. It is a good, enjoyable and challenging read.

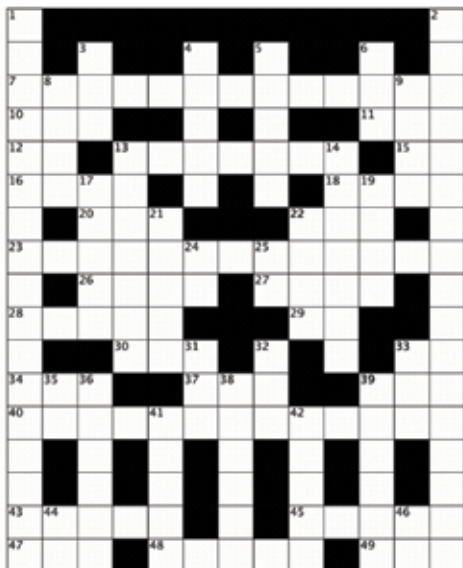
