



September is a time of

adventure. A time of

new beginnings. Each September my children loved preparing their new pencil cases and book bags. As we begin this new academic year, let us take time to pray for and think about our local teachers who work tirelessly to ensure that our children have the promise of learning and opportunity. We thank God for them all. We also think of all parents and carers who will be home educating and for our Wimborne Minster families work and the Home Ed group. Let us also remember that for so many millions of children and young people in our world, education remains unavailable. Due to war, ill health, disasters and displacement the most fundamental basics of learning provision is snatched away. Mark 12:31 asks us to love our neighbours, and Christian Aid, founded in 1945, has been working tirelessly for 80 years.

### **Back to School**

to enable us to love all children of the world:



- After years of civil war, which has destroyed basic schooling provision in South Sudan, Christian Aid has been training teachers and setting up education supplies in temporary and long-term refugee camps.
- In Lebanon steep inflation has meant that insecurity in food provision is high, especially amongst Syrian refugees. This is a concern as many young people and children have subsequently dropped out of school. Since 2014, Christian Aid has been offering educational and psychosocial support to disadvantaged children.
- Whilst hurricanes and earthquakes frequently cause trauma to school children in Haiti, Christian Aid reaches out with therapy, enabling on-going engagement with education.
- In Ethiopia girls can feel barriers to attending school due to basic health concerns, Christian Aid ensures that feminine hygiene kits are provided.
- In Bangladesh, communities that flood

due to climate change, can become cut off and so Christian Aid brings education into isolated areas.



God made us and all his children with the aift of curiosity and the desire to learn. At Wimborne Minster, and all our village churches we are celebrating 80 years of Christian Aid. We give thanks for the work of this charity and for all teachers around the globe who have been called to the vocation of wanting to see children educated. flourishing, thriving and obtaining the future they so all desperately need. Let us all stand together and support and pray for children around our world today.

### More than Bones & Stones the new Heritage resources

The question was asked 'How could we enhance the Minster profile to the public?' In response I formed a small group. Gordon Edgar (guides) Mike and Javne Twomey (Chained Library) and my wife Heather (children's education resource writer and author) and myself (TV/ AV) to see how we could answer that question. We met regularly over the last year developing ideas.

The theme we settled



on was 'Explore and Discover' - More than Bones and Stones' and this was developed along a number of strands that now make up the full enhanced offering to our visitors.

Imagine you are walking down one of the streets around the Minster. What tells you we are open at that distance? What tells you there is anything here to see?

This was where our thinking started, and resulted in the flags you now see placed outside. These will be deployed Monday to Saturday throughout the main visitor season. As you come through the main porch, a pull up bannerin the same design adds the theme 'More than Bones and Stones' and highlights several key areas of interest. You come through the main door and an A1 framed poster tells you what is available on the resources table beside it and across the Minster. There you will find...

**Exploring games:** 

Heather has developed new games that not only entertain children but also inform them, games with a purpose featuring Margaret Beaufort and Isaac Gulliver along with a new all-age trail to follow.

For adults: we have retained the single sheet guide and Gordon has added an A4 booklet to borrow and return. Shorter, themed guides are in development and will be available soon.

Our four TV screens

are being used to show more: one has the weekly Minster news, one has slide presentations on history and the organ, on a third, a video sequence shows the Minster as a lively Christian community, and the fourth, has kept the Chained Library video.

**Augmented Reality** (AR), not to be confused with virtual reality (VR) that puts you in goggles into created worlds. AR places objects using your phone camera into the space you are standing in. When deciding to use AR we set the criteria: no handing out of tablets: no app to download; no IT support offered: no charge; no persistent software (the tech we use downloads to your phone browser and deletes when you close the browser). It will not work on all phones (but a list of those it does runs to about 30 pages!) and the phone does need a QR code scanner. Today

we have three examples working - the West Tower, the Astronomical Clock and the Triforium. Do come and try this out. Some thank you's: first to the team, Mike and Jayne Twomey, Gordon Edgar and Heather Butler, and then to those who offered other skills:

Steve Reckless (who made the AR for us), Harriet Jackson (graphic design), Martin Smith (help with the Minster layout, and design skills), Anthony Oliver (for supplying many photos for the Christian Community sequence) and Rector Andrew the Church Wardens and the PCC for trusting us to take this forward.

Now it's over to you.


### How the Christian Church invented the 'English'

First Cuthburga Lecture, Saturday 6th September, by Martyn Whittock

We often take for granted the existence of a place called 'England' and a community of those living there to be 'English'. In the middle of the tenth century these concepts were new, even revolutionary, as rulers of Wessex sought to forge one political community from several newly brought under their rule. However, the concept of the 'English' was already over 250 years old and was the invention of the church, as it sought to convert disparate warring kingdoms. In this year's First Cuthburga Lecture, Martyn Whittock first explores how the invention of the 'English' accompanied Christian conversion and had huge implications. After the break for refreshments, he will further explore how - following conversion -'holy learning' and mission were a core strategy in embedding Christianity in local culture and communities, and

in the evangelisation of still-pagan communities in north-western Europe, in which the religious women of Wimborne played a major part.

If you have heard Martyn speak, in the Minster or elsewhere, you will remember how erudite, compelling and entertaining a speaker he is. He taught secondary-school history for over 35 vears, and is the author of 58 books. He is particularly interested in the 'deep stories' that form part of modern identities. Recent books include: 'Trump and the Puritans' (2020), 'American Vikings' (2023) and 'Vikings in the East: From Vladimir the Great to Vladimir Putin' (2025). Martyn is a Licensed Lay Minister in Salisbury diocese and is a member of the leadership team at St Thomas' in Trowbridge.

### September Music Notes

Our Patronal Festival on August 31st is the start of the month-long Cuthburga Festival, with a series of events of different kinds.

The Second Cuthburga Lecture (13th September) is a choral recital by the Minster Choir, directed by Colin Davey. Churchwarden Peter Cook will guide us through performances of music from the history of the Minster, and show how different composers treated the text for Holy Communion (the Mass) and other biblical and Prayer Book texts.

The following week (20th September), the Minster Makes Music charity presents the Haywood Organ Recital with John Challenger, Assistant Director of Music at Salisbury Cathedral. John was a chorister at Hereford Cathedral, and Organ Scholar at St George's Chapel, Windsor and St John's College, Cambridge, coming to Salisbury in 2012. John has recorded three solo CDs since 2015, and in 2017, was acting Director of Music at St John's College, Cambridge for three months.

During the Flower Festival there will be a short evening recital with organ music written and played by Minster Organists, past and present.







### **Children's Society Coffee Morning**

The Annual Children's Society's Box Collection and Coffee Morning will be held on Saturday. 4th October in Church House Lounge from 10:30 to 12:30. Please could you bring your box along on that day, and collect your new one. If you can't make it that day, please leave your box in the Parish Office.

Young people are being exploited online and offline. Children as young as 10, are being groomed or coerced into, for example, being sexually exploited, forced to launder criminal money, transporting drugs, and stealing. The Children's Society's Look Closer campaign, and through information on its website, helps us spot signs of exploitation - children travelling alone, those seeming anxious, frightened, those in possession of more than one phone, carrying lots of cash, or being controlled by individuals who are older than them are some of the signs that they are being exploited.

The Society urges us to report it if we notice anything suggesting a child or young person is being exploited. The NSPCC, Police, or Transport Police are among the organisations we can contact if we are worried.

The Children's Society's work is growing, especially with increased child poverty and exploitation, but we can all help - through the collection boxes, donations, and also through volunteering, vigilance and prayer. (Find


information and advice, written by young people and staff, at Please come along and support us on 20th September, to help the Society's work, and keep your eyes open for any signs of child exploitation. The Children's Society believes that no child needing help should be alone, and that building hope in the future is an essential step in helping young people to live fulfilling lives.

For 80 years, it has provided humanitarian relief and long-term development support for poor communities worldwide, while highlighting suffering, tackling injustice and championing people's rights.

The current Restore campaign highlights the combination of climate crisis and the debt crisis that many African

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Save Our Swifts

Swifts spend almost

wind-drifted insects

by day and going into

the whole of their lives

high in the sky, catching

sleep-mode at night. The only time that they touch a solid surface is when they lay their eggs and rear their young. They arrive in Europe at the beginning of May and spend the months of May, June and the first half of July in Britain before leaving for Africa in late summer. Until the 1980s, flocks of swifts that could be seen in the streets of any English town, speeding in flocks of ten or twenty at roof-top level as they displayed to each other and took up residence in their nest holes. Sadly, this is a rare sight today: one by one the little gaps in buildings have been filled in, and the insects on which the birds feed have been heavily reduced by agricultural pesticides and nocturnal light pollution. Swifts have been in the news recently, as conservationists have urged the government to bring in a legal requirement for new buildings to include 'swift

So far this law has not been passed, and it has been left to volunteers to take action. Recently Swift Groups have been set up in towns over the country, including Poole, Christchurch, Swanage, and Wimborne. The Wimborne Swift group has been making a survey of swift nests in the town, and these have been

logged

on the RSPB's Swiftmapper system. We found swifts still nest in the St John's area and around West Street and Chapel Lane. If you see someone walking up and down your road with a clipboard around sunset and looking at the rooflines of houses. please feel free to come and talk to them. They aren't soffit salesmen! Our other major task has been to install nest boxes. Many of these were made by the 2nd Wimborne Scouts. using wood donated by Churchview Joinery in Wimborne, and additional boxes have been made by volunteer Brent Jones. The trickiest job of all for any Swift Group is finding an insured person willing to go up the ladder to fix a box under the eaves at

bricks' in the cavity walls. : first-floor level, and we are especially grateful to Bill Townsend of Townsend Carpentry in Poole and his father Pete for carrying out this difficult task on a. voluntary basis. The project also

> received a big boost in June this year when Wimborne Town Council agreed to install four of our nest boxes on the Town Hall, Boxes in Wimborne now number about 23, and we eagerly

await the first swift occupants. We are also grateful to the Lion Hotel in West Street for letting us use part of their bar room for our meetings. If you would like to find out more about swift conservation.

The Minster Environment Group (MEG) has been working with BlackmorelT and DonatelT for over 10 years and we thought it was abouttime we took a visit and see what happens to all the old IT kit we have collected in that time. On August 5th a group from MEG and Planet Wimborne went to the BlackmorelT premises in Warminster, Simon Barfoot the CEO of BlackmorelT and director of DonatelT welcomed us and we had a presentation on the processes and accreditations that underpin the outstanding service BlackmorelT provide to their high-profile clients. They are held to the highest standards for data management and removal and can be inspected with no advanced warning. It was clear that the care and ethical approach was a theme across the organisation and it was not surprising that they have a high retention of both clients and staff. We then toured the factory starting with the security of delivered



kit which then is automatically inspected and wiped. Any kit that cannot be refurbished is then stripped into its component parts and metals are sent for reclaiming; any gold is sent to the Royal Mint. Other materials are shredded ready for recycling. Kit that is reusable is refurbished. BlackmorelT (https:// www.blackmoreit.com) has an online and ebay shop where orders are satisfied from the refurbished kit. DonatelT (https:// donateit.co.uk) is a separate operation sponsored by BlackmorelT, Whilst our personal kit does not require the very high level of security that industry needs. DonatelT is still robust at data wiping. Using volunteers to carry

out the process it provides funds and refurbished kit for those in need. Simon presented us with a laptop for Wimborne Food Bank, This had been requested so the staff at the food bank can work with their clients to create their own accounts, CVs and ob applications. Over the years MEG has collected tons of IT kit and received laptops. tablets and phones that have gone to those that needed them in the Wimborne area. The last collection in April took 134 items making 251kgs of old kit. Our next collection will be as part of the Planet Wimborne Green

Festival on October 11th, 12 noon till 2pm in the Minster. Please hunt out your old IT kit and bring it along so we can help more people to have access to the IT they need. Up until now MEG has just run one off session a few times a year but we are looking to set up permanent collection site in Wimborne, with secure storage so watch this

space for news.
